Having a General Anaesthetic a Photostory



You will receive a letter telling you when need to come to hospital.



On the operation day you will come to the hospital entrance



This is the Main Entrance to the hospital.



There is also another entrance called the Tower Block Entrance



Ask at the reception for directions to the ward.



There are coloured signs to follow to help you find the way.



Make sure you use the hand gel before going onto the ward.




When you get to the ward, you meet the ward clerk.

Tell them your name.



You will be shown to a comfy chair.



You will be given a gown to put on.



A name band will be put on your wrist



The name band tells every one who you are.



You cannot have anything to eat before an operation



You cannot have anything to drink before an operation



A nurse will take your blood pressure with a cuff the goes around your arm.



A Nurse will take your temperature with a thermometer



The nurse will use a peg on your finger to check your pulse and oxygen level.



You may have some medicine to make you feel more relaxed.




There is nurses call bell to press if you need any help



The nurses will come and ask if there is anything they can help you with.



The nurse will put some magic cream on your hand to numb them.



A sticky plaster is placed over the cream.



This will stop the cream from rubbing off.



The anaesthetist will come and meet you and ask you some questions.



He will listen to your chest to make sure your breathing is ok.



The Theatre staff will check your name bracelet to make sure it is right




You will be taken down to theatre on a trolley. Sometimes you can walk down



You will be met by a theatre nurse who will put some monitoring equipment on you.



The nurse will take the plaster and cream off the back of your hand.



The doctor will then put a cannula in with a needle. This will not hurt as the cream will have made the skin numb.



There will be lots of people in the anaesthetic room to talk to you and support you.



You will be given some air to breath through a mask.



The doctor will put some sleeping medicine into the straw into your hand to make you go to sleep.



After the operation you will be sleepy and will have a mask giving you oxygen.



There will be a nurse with you in the recovery room when you wake up.



You may still feel a little sleepy after the anaethetic.



The nurses will talk to you to make sure you are feeling ok and not in pain.

You will then go back to the ward.



When you are feeling well enough you can finally have a cup of tea!!



When you are well you can go home!
